Another method of connecting optical fibers is termination or connectorization, which consists of processing the end of a fiber optic bundle so that it can be connected to other fibers or devices through fiber optic. As fiber optic connections become increasingly mainstream, the need to connect fiber optic cables to one another — or splicing — is also on the rise. That process is called splicing. An Optical Fiber Fusion Splicer is a high-tech machine that uses heat to melt (or “fuse”) the ends of two optical fibers together.
